1.2 Origin of the tournament

Hockey has been an international sport for a very long time. Since 1908 men's hockey has been an Olympic sport, while the first World Cup tournament took place in Spain back in 1971. However, the introduction of women's hockey at international level took quite a few years. Originally women's hockey was conceived as a non-competitive sport and did not acquire its Olympic status until the Moscow Olympic Games in 1980.

This year's women's World Cup tournament in Rosario, Argentina, is the 12th in history, with the first having been played in Mandelieu, France, in 1974. The Netherlands became the first ever winners of the World Cup. In France the Dutch team only lost their Group A match against India 0-1. In the gold medal match against Argentina Nel van Kollenburg scored the only goal of the match in extra time. West-Germany were ranked third, beating India in the bronze medal match 2-0. Heidemarie Klimpel and Steffi Drescher were the two goal scorers in this match. Drescher also became the tournament top scorer (7).



The FIH decided to stage the women's World Cup once every two years, but in 1986, after the sixth World Cup edition held in Amstelveen, The Netherlands, the rhythm was changed to today's four-year-cycle. This year's edition, the 12th in history, will take place in Rosario, Argentina and will feature Olympic, World and European Champion Netherlands, Olympic silver medallist and Asia Cup holders China, England, Olympic bronze medallist, Pan American Cup holders and host country Argentina, Germany, Oceania Champion New Zealand, India, Africa Cup holders South Africa, Spain and the three winners of the World Cup Qualifying tournaments Australia, Japan and Korea. It is the second time that a women's World Cup will be played in Argentina. In 1981 the fourth World Cup edition was staged in Buenos Aires.

In 2006 in Madrid, Spain, the Netherlands won its sixth World Championship after beating Australia 3-1 in the gold medal match (picture), with Maartje Paumen scoring two and tournament top scorer Sylvia Karres one goal. Argentina took bronze smashing Spain 5-0 in the bronze medal match.

Luciana Aymar and Naomi van As have both been voted 2009 Women's Player of the Year. This is the first time the WorldHockey award is shared by two players. Luciana Aymar collected her sixth Women's Player of the Year award and her third in succession (2001, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008 and 2009). She is the most decorated player since the awards were first introduced in 1998. A brilliant, attacking midfielder for Argentina since her international debut against the Netherlands in the 1998 World Cup. She lists Diego Maradona as an idol, but her pace, vision and superb ball control on the hockey pitch have led to her being universally acknowledged as 'La Maga' (the magician). Aymar's lists of trophy wins with Las Leonas is impressive - three consecutive Pan American Games titles, four Champions Trophies and the 2002 World Cup as well as an Olympic silver in 2000. She was also part of the team that won the bronze medals at the 2004 and 2008 Olympic Games.

Young midfielder Madonna Blyth made her international debut as an 18-year-old at the 2004 Champions Trophy in Rosario where Australia lost the bronze medal play-off to Argentina and finished fourth. 'Donnie' was part of the gold medal winning team at the 2006 Commonwealth Games and won silver medals at the 2005 Champions Trophy and 2006 World Cup. She also featured in the Australian side that finished fifth at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing. Born and bred in Brisbane, Blyth plays for the Queensland Scorchers in the Australian Hockey League and enjoys listening to music, going to the beach, animals and watching films. She was a nominee for the 2007 FIH Young Player of the Year award and says her childhood idols were Australian basketball player Lauren Jackson and seven-time world surfing champion Layne Beachley.

Chinese defender Ma Yibo has been a cornerstone of the rapidly improving fortunes of the Chinese women's team. Having only begun playing the game in 1995 as a 15-year-old, she played in her first Champions Trophy tournament in 2001 where China finished fourth, and just one year later she was a member of the gold medal winning Chinese team at the 2002 Champions Trophy in Macau. Ma has two Champions Trophy silver medals from 2003 and 2006 to her name and was a member of the Asian Games gold medal winning teams in Busan (2002) and Doha (2006). Ma captained the hosts to silver at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing after also featuring in the Chinese team that finished fourth in Athens. She was short-listed for the FIH 'Young Player of the Year' award in 2002 and 2003, and enjoys listening to music and collecting stamps in her spare time.

Born in Boston in England, Crista Cullen took up the game of hockey as a nine-year-old in Kenya where she spent the first 12 years of her life. An athletic, feisty and totally committed defender, she made her international debut for England against Scotland in 2002 and played in her first major tournament at the 2003 Champions Trophy where Great Britain finished fifth. She is a penalty corner specialist who plays club hockey for Leicester. With serious motivation and an unyielding attitude on the pitch, this 25-year-old looks likely to be a top class player for some years to come. She was part of the team that won the bronze medal at the 2006 Commonwealth Games in Melbourne. Cullen made the shortlist of names nominated for the Women's Young Player of the Year award in 2008 after leading Team GB to fifth place at the 2008 Olympics in Beijing.

She became the fourth member of the Keller Dynasty to win an Olympic Games medal after the German national team secured gold at the 2004 Games in Athens. The 31-year-old forward was also instrumental in the national side's 2008 Olympic campaign however her quick thinking and impressive skills were not enough to lift the women's team which bowed out to Argentina in the bronze medal game. Making her international debut in 1994 and known as 'Taschi, ' she was named Player of the Year by the FIH in 1999. Born in Berlin, she plays domestically for Berlin Hockey Club. The family's list of accolades stretches back to her grandfather, Edwin, who won silver at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. Her father Carsten won gold in 1972, her step-brother Andreas won silver in 1984 and 1988 before winning gold in 1992. Brother Florian won gold with the men's team in 2008.

Always wearing a hint of make-up, Kaori Chiba has developed into something of a pin-up girl for women's hockey as well as a potent force in front of goal for Japan. Her strike power led Japan to best-ever fifth place results in both the 2006 World Cup and 2007 Champions Trophy tournaments. Chiba was also part of the team that won the silver medal at the 2006 Asian Games in Doha. After suffering serious knee ligament damage at the beginning of 2003, she used the time not only to rehabilitate her knee, but also to watch hours of footage and focus on how the world's top forwards 'ghost' into position to strike on goal.
